




# LET MOUNT ZION REJOICE!

# PALM SUNDAY - Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem

Matthew 21-22, Mark 11-12, Luke 19-20, John 12

**Palm Sunday**, also known as "Passion Sunday," is the final Sunday of Lent, the beginning of Holy Week; it commemorates the triumphant arrival of Christ in Jerusalem. Christians believe it was a week before His death and resurrection, and the events of that day are recalled in special Palm Sunday services where the faithful receive palm branches. Palm branches symbolize victory and triumph over death. Palm Sunday is the feast that falls on the Sunday before Easter.

The holy city of Jerusalem was crowded with pilgrims who had come for the annual Passover celebration. Jesus had spent many months traveling through the towns and villages of Palestine. He preached about the kingdom of God and healed the sick wherever He went. Now the time had come for Him to claim His title as the Messiah - the Savior that God had promised to the Jewish people.

Jesus knew His mission was almost finished. As they traveled to Jerusalem, **Jesus warned His disciples that He would soon be put to death, and after three days He would rise again.** As they came near Jerusalem, Jesus told two of His disciples to go into a nearby village and bring a donkey that would be waiting there. Jesus rode into Jerusalem on the donkey. Crowds of people spread their cloaks on the ground in front of Him. Some waved branches of palm trees, a sign of victory. The people sang and shouted,

#### Hosanna! Blessed is the One who comes in the name of the Lord – the King of Israel!

Cleansing of the Temple: Jesus went to the temple once He got into Jerusalem, and He didn't like what He saw. This most holy of places had been turned into a marketplace. Merchants were selling animals for temple sacrifices. Money changers were exchanging the pilgrims' money for special coins used in the temple. Many of these people were cheating the pilgrims who came to celebrate Passover in Jerusalem.

Jesus turned over the seats of the merchants and the tables of the money changers, scattering their coins. He told them all to leave. He made a whip of some cords and used it to drive out the animals. He said, It is written, 'My house will be called a house of prayer for all nations,' But you have made it a den of robbers!

**Teaching and Healing**: Jesus went to the temple every day. Blind people, crippled people and sick people came to Him, and He healed all of them.

An expert on the Jewish Law asked Jesus which of God's commandments was most important. Jesus replied, 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. The second is just as important: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' All the other commandments and the teachings of the prophets are based on these two.

**Conflict with the Chief Priests and Elders:** Not everyone was happy that Jesus was preaching at the temple every day. The chief priests and elders of the temple were angry. The temple officials felt their authority slipping away.

These temple officials came up with a plan to trap Jesus with His own words. They came to Jesus and demanded to know by what authority he was doing all these things. If Jesus said His authority was from God, they would accuse Him of blasphemy. If He did not claim authority from God, they could say He was just a crazy man.

But Jesus knew it was a trap. Instead of answering the question, He asked them another question: "Did the baptism of John come from heaven?" The temple officials realized this was also a trap. So, they refused to answer. As usual, Jesus had defeated his opponents at their own game. But the temple officials were even more angry and began to plot to have Jesus killed.

**Lessons:** For the Jews, Jerusalem was the holy City of God. When Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a donkey, He fulfilled an Old Testament prophecy (Zechariah 9:9-10) and left little doubt that He was accepting the title of \*Messiah. Jesus was adored by the crowds of people who had come to Jerusalem for Passover.

But there was harsh conflict between Jesus and Jerusalem's religious leaders. These conflicts led to Jesus being crucified less than a week after entering Jerusalem.

Jesus did some of His most important preaching during this final week. He spoke of His second coming and told parables of the kingdom of God. Most of all He said we must put our total trust in God and put that trust into action with kindness for other people.

\*Messiah comes from a Hebrew word meaning "the anointed one." In Old Testament times, important people like kings and priests were anointed with oil as a sign of their office. For hundreds of years, the Jews had expected God to send them a special king (Daniel 9:25-26, Isaiah 7:14-17, 11:1-9, Micah 5:2). Jesus avoided accepting the title Messiah until the very end because the people were expecting their Messiah to be a military and political leader instead of a spiritual leader. In Greek, the original language of the New Testament, *christos* means "anointed one," and that is from whence the word "Christ" is derived.

# **MAUNDY THURSDAY**

Maundy Thursday, observed during Holy Week on the Thursday before Easter, commemorates the Last



Supper when Jesus shared the Passover meal with His disciples on the night before He was crucified. Derived from the Latin word *mandatum*, meaning "commandment," *Maundy* refers to the commands Jesus gave His disciples at the Last Supper: to love with humility by serving one another and to remember His sacrifice.

Two important biblical events are the primary focus of the Maundy Thursday Passover Meal:

Before the Passover meal, **Jesus washed the feet of His disciples**. By performing this lowly act of service the Bible says in John 13:1 that Jesus "showed them the full extent of his love." By His example, Jesus demonstrated how Christians are to love one another through humble service. For this reason, many churches practice foot-washing ceremo-

nies as a part of their Maundy Thursday services.

During the Passover meal, Jesus took bread and wine and asked His Father to bless it. He broke the bread into pieces, giving it to His disciples and said, "*This is My body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of Me*." Then He took the cup of wine, shared it with His disciples and said, "*This wine is the token of God's new covenant to save you--an agreement sealed with the blood I will pour out for you.*"

These events recorded in Luke 22:19-20 describe the Last Supper and form the biblical basis for the practice of **Communion**. For this reason, many churches hold special Communion services as a part of their Maundy Thursday celebrations. Likewise, many congregations observe a traditional

Passover Seder Meal.

#### PASSOVER FEAST - PESACH:

Passover commemorates the liberation of the Israelites from slavery in Egypt, as recorded in the book of Exodus. On Passover, Jews also celebrate the birth of the Jewish nation after being freed by God from captivity. The Hebrew word *Pesach* means "to pass over." During Passover Jews take part in a meal known as the Seder, which incorporates the retelling of the story of Exodus and God's deliverance from their bondage in Egypt. The following food items traditionally appear on the Seder plate:



- •Matzoh: Unleavened matzohs are placed within the folds of a napkin as a reminder of the haste with which the Israelites fled Egypt, leaving no time for the dough to rise.
- •Maror/Chazeret: bitter herbs, like horseradish or romaine lettuce, used to symbolize the bitterness of slavery.
- •Charoses: a mixture of apples, nuts, wine, and cinnamon, as a reminder of the mortar used by the Jews in the construction of buildings as slaves
- •Beitzah: a roasted egg, as a symbol of life and the perpetuation of existence.
- •Karpas: a vegetable, usually parsley or celery, representing hope and redemption; served with a bowl of salted water to represent the tears shed.
- •Zeroah: traditionally a piece of roasted lamb shankbone, symbolizing the paschal sacrificial offering. There is also **Wine/Grape Juice** (4 servings) representing God's four promises and words of redemption; a time for rejoicing; and **Candles** representing God's presence at the meal.

# **GOOD FRIDAY**

**GOOD FRIDAY commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus and His death at Calvary**. Services are traditionally observed from Noon to 3:00 p.m. during Holy Week as part of the Paschal Triduum on the Friday preceding Easter Sunday. (Read Matthew 27:1-62, Mark 15:1-47, Luke 22:63-23:56, and John 18:28-19:37).

The most important symbol of Good Friday, also called Holy Friday, is the crucifix, or cross, which represents the way in which Jesus died. Jesus died for us. Christ knew in death He would take on the sins of the world to set believers free from sin and death.

The night before He died, Jesus and His disciples took part in the Last Supper and then went to the Garden of Gethsemane. There, Jesus spent His last hours praying to the Father while His disciples slept nearby.

Late that evening in Gethsemane, Jesus was betrayed with a kiss by Judas Iscariot. Before morning dawned, Jesus was arrested. At daybreak, He was questioned by the Sanhedrin and condemned. But before they could put Him to death, the religious leaders first needed Rome to approve of their death sentence. Jesus was taken to Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor in Judea. Pilate found no reason to charge Jesus. When he discovered that Jesus was from Galilee, which was under Herod's jurisdiction, Pilate had Jesus sent to Herod who was in Jerusalem at the time.

Jesus refused to answer Herod's questions, so Herod sent Him back to Pilate. Although Pilate found Him innocent, he feared the crowds who wanted Jesus crucified. so he sentenced Jesus to death.

Jesus was brutally beaten, mocked, struck on the head with a staff and spit upon. A crown of thorns was placed on his head and He was stripped naked. He was made to carry His own cross, but when He grew too weak, Simon of Cyrene (Matthew 27:32) was forced to carry it for Him.

Jesus was led to Calvary where soldiers drove stake-like nails through His wrists and ankles, affixing Him to the cross. An inscription that read "King of the Jews" was placed over His head. While He was on the cross, soldiers cast lots for Jesus' clothing. Onlookers shouted insults and jeered.

Two criminals were crucified at the same time. One hung on Jesus' right and the other on His left.



## The Seven Last Words of Christ

First Word: Father, Forgive Them...Luke 23:34

As evening fell, Joseph of Arimathea with the help of Nicodemus took Jesus' body down from the cross and had Him placed in His own new tomb that was guarded by Roman soldiers. A great stone was rolled over the entrance, sealing the tomb.

But the story does not end here...

# RESURRECTION SUNDAY

# **EASTER**

**Easter**, also called **Pascha** (Aramaic, Greek, Latin) or **Resurrection Sunday**, commemorates the resurrection of Jesus from the dead, described in the New Testament as having occurred on the third day after His burial following His crucifixion by the Romans at Calvary c. 30 AD. It is the culmination of the Passion of Jesus preceded by **Lent**, a 40-day period (not counting Sundays) of fasting, penance and prayer.

Palm Sunday commemorate Jesus's entry in Jerusalem. Most Christians refer to the week before Easter as "Holy Week," which contains the days of the Easter Triduum (Latin for "Three Days"), including Maundy Thursday, commemorating the Maundy and Last Supper, as well as Good Friday, commemorating the crucifixion and death of Jesus. The day before Easter is called Holy Saturday. Many churches begin celebrating Easter late in the evening of Holy Saturday at a service called the Easter Vigil. Eastertide, or Paschaltide, The Easter Season, begins on Easter Sunday and lasts seven weeks, ending with the coming of the 50th day, Pentecost Sunday.

Easter and the holidays that are related to it are *moveable feasts* which do not fall on a fixed date in the Gregorian or Julian calendars which follow only the cycle of the Sun; rather, its date is offset from the date of Passover and is therefore calculated based on a lunisolar calendar similar to the Hebrew calendar. Easter is linked to the Jewish Passover (Hebrew: pesach, Aramaic: κροφραscha) by much of its symbolism, as well as by its position in the calendar. In most European languages the feast is called by the words for Passover in those languages; and in the older English versions of the Bible the term Easter was the term used to translate passover.

Easter customs vary across the Christian world, and include sunrise services, exclaiming the Paschal greeting, clipping the church, and decorating Easter eggs (symbols of the empty tomb). The Easter lily, a symbol of the resurrection, traditionally decorates the chancel area of churches on this day and for the rest of Eastertide. Additional customs that have become associated with Easter and are observed by Christians and some non-Christians include egg hunting, the Easter Bunny, and Easter parades. There are also various traditional Easter foods that vary regionally.

The resurrection of Jesus, which Easter celebrates, is one of the chief tenets of the Christian faith. The resurrection established Jesus as the Son of God and is cited as proof that God will right-eously judge the world. For those who trust in Jesus's death and resurrection, "death is swallowed up in victory." Any person who chooses to follow Jesus receives "a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead". Through faith in the working of God those who follow Jesus are spiritually resurrected with Him so that they may walk in a new way of life and receive eternal salvation, being physically resurrected to dwell in the Kingdom of Heaven.

Easter is linked to Passover and the Exodus from Egypt recorded in the Old Testament through the Last Supper, sufferings, and crucifixion of Jesus that preceded the resurrection. According to the three Synoptic Gospels, Jesus gave the Passover meal a new meaning, as in the upper room during the Last Supper He prepared Himself and His disciples for His death. He identified the bread and cup of wine as His body, soon to be sacrificed, and His blood, soon to be shed. Paul states, "Get rid of the old yeast that you may be a new batch without yeast—as you really are. For Christ, our Passover lamb, has been sacrificed"; this refers to the Passover requirement to have no yeast in the house and to the allegory of Jesus as the Paschal lamb.



# **EASTER SUNDAY LITANY**

On that first Easter morning, as the sun was dawning, Jesus rose triumphantly from the dead. The earth shook as the angel rolled the stone away.

No grave could hold his body down. He is risen. He is risen indeed!

As Mary Magdalene and the other Mary looked on in fear, the Risen Lord revealed himself to them, and they departed with great joy.

Rejoice! And again I say rejoice! For Christ Jesus has broken the curse of death and destroyed the power that it once had over us.

Although we live in a world filled with moral decay and violence, and although we were stripped of our original culture and our past as a people, we, like Christ, can be resurrected.

Give glory to God, who humbled himself, even to death on a cross. Give glory to the exalted Christ!

The same power that raised Jesus from the dead is now given to each of us and to all those who believe on him.

Let us receive this spiritual power and use it wisely for the liberation of all God's people!

Let us make a joyful noise unto the Lord. For there is none like him who can break the chain of oppression, evil, and the grave. He is risen and is seated at the right hand of God.

"Worthy is the Lamb that was slaughtered to receive power and wealth and wisdom and might and honor and glory and blessing!" (Rev. 5:12)

Who is worthy? Christ is worthy. "Because he lives, I can face tomorrow. Because he lives, all fear is gone. Because I know he holds the future and life is worth the living just because he lives."

"Who is worthy? The Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, conquered, so that he can open the scroll and its seven seals." (Rev. 5:13)

Who is worthy? The One seated on the throne and the Lamb. To them be all blessing and honor and glory and might!

He is worthy! The Risen Christ! The Resurrected One! Praise him! Praise his Holy Name!





# **OUR FOREMOTHERS: WOMEN OF WISDOM**

Since the founding of Mount Zion Baptist Church in 1890, our foremothers have been faithful servants of the Lord and an integral part of this Church. They were prayer warriors, members of the predominantly white congregation at First Baptist Church, who wanted a church for their own community. Many of their names are lost to us; however, some records have listed the following women as founding members of Mount Zion: *Mrs. Birdett, Mrs. Braxton, Mrs. E. W. Butler, Mrs. Robert A. Clark, Mrs. Edmunds, Mrs. Eliza Washington, Mrs. Sheppard and Miss Sallie Freeman*. They were the foundation for our current Women's Ministry.

Mrs. Martha Payne, who initiated negotiations in 1904 for the purchase of the property on which Mount Zion's first building was erected, served as the President of the Women's Missionary Society in the early 1900's; Former First Lady Corine Carter also held this position in the 1910's; Mrs. Annie Coleman (1920's) and Mrs. Ora Bell Jackson (1930's)



**Deaconess Clara J. Bonner** served three terms as President of the Women's Baptist Missionary Society, 1920's – 1930's.

She served eight consecutive terms as President of the Women's Convention of the General Baptist Association of Washington and was our representative for the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc. She chaired the Deaconess Board from 1942 to 1945, and was awarded **Life-Time Deaconess** status in 1947.



served as President from 1938 to 1941.

She was the President of the \Women's Department of the North Pacific Baptist Convention in 1948 and from 1950 to 1953.



Former First Lady Vivienne Penick was President of the Women's Missionary Society,1941 - 1942. She holds the title of President Emeritus for the Women's Department of the North Pacific Baptist Convention where she was President from 1948 to 1950. She was also the Recording Secretary for the Women's Department of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc. from 1948 to 1950.



**Deaconess Allen Mae Douglas** was elected to serve as the first President of the re-organized Women's Society in January of 1943. (1942 - 1944). She also served as Chair of the Deaconess Board in 1954.



Documents on which we base our 81st Anniversary recorded *Former First Lady Doris Watts Lloyd* as the speaker for the first Women's Day Program that was held on May 13, 1956, at 3:00 p.m.

She was president of the NPBC Women's Department from 1966 to 1969.





# A Tribute to Washington State Legislative Trailblazers

CARR NOTES

Rep. Marjorie Pitter-King (1921 - 1996)

Party: Democrat District: 37 King County

Branch: House of Representatives

First African-American woman to serve in the House of Representatives Served: 1965–1966 by an appointed to an unexpired term; she focused on civil rights





Rep. Peggy Joan Maxie (1936 - 2024)

Party: Democrat District: 37 King County
Branch: House of Representatives Years Served: 1971-1982

First African-American woman elected to the House of Representatives. Rep. Maxie challenged the proposed redistricting based on the 1970 census. She filed an affidavit stating that her district had been undercounted and two years later, a federal court ordered the State to conduct its redistricting using a non-partisan map. 1973 she was the prime sponsor of the House version of a bill that became the Landlord-Tenant Act of Washington State.



Party: Democrat District: 29 Pierce County

Branch: House of Representatives and Senate

Years Served: 1991-1993 House of Representatives; 1993-2010 Senate First African-American woman appointed to the Senate where she became the First African American woman in the US elected to serve as President Pro Tempore,

2001 and 2005 - 2010

Party: Democrat District: 37 King County

Branch: House of Representatives

Year Served: Appointed 1994 to an unexpired term She ushed for property tax relief for seniors and

disability retirees



Party: Democrat District: 37 King County
Branch: House of Representatives Years Served: 1995-1998
During her time in Olympia she was the Assistant Minority Whip.

As the **only Black member of the House of Representatives in 1995**, she was instrumental in defeating an anti-affirmative action bill and reforming the system of juvenile prosecution. She was named Legislator of the Year in 1996 by the Washington Student

Lobby, In 1998 Rep. Mason was appointed by President Bill Clinton

to the Women's Economic Roundtable.



In the 118th Congress, Strickland sits on the House Armed Services Committee and the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee. She serves as whip for the Congressional Black Caucus and is a member of the Congressional Asian Pacific American Caucus, the Bipartisan Historically Black Colleges and Universities Caucus, and the New Democrat Coalition.





**Women's History Month** had its origins as a national celebration in 1981 when Congress passed Pub. L. 97-28 which authorized and requested the President to proclaim the week beginning March 7, 1982 as "Women's History Week." Through the next five years, Congress continued to pass joint resolutions designating a week in March as "Women's History Week."

In 1987 after being petitioned by the National Women's History Project, Congress passed Pub. L. 100-9 which designated the month of **March** 1987 as "**Women's History Month.**" Between 1988 and 1994, Congress passed additional resolutions requesting and authorizing the President to proclaim March of each year as Women's History Month. Since 1995, presidents have issued a series of annual proclamations designating the month of March as "Women's History Month."

The National Women's History Month's theme for 2024 celebrates

"Women Who Advocate for Equity, Diversity and Inclusion." The theme recognizes women throughout the country who understand that, for a positive future, we need to eliminate bias and discrimination entirely from our lives and institutions. Women from every background have long realized that an uneven playing field will never bring equality or justice. Throughout 2024, we honor local women from the past and present who have taken the lead to show the importance of change and to establish firmer safeguards, practices and legislation reflecting these values.
