

The Zionews Coordinating Committee was organized in 1956 by Deacon Tom Brown under the pastorate of Reverend Gil B. Lloyd.

Charter members included Edith Smith, Bessie Lyles, and Alva Smith. F. J. Johnson, Jr. was the editor of the first edition published in 1957.

That same year, the Committee expanded to include Yvonne Beatty, Zelda Brown, Clara Coleman, Nora Hatter, Helen Hornbuckle, Willie Horton, Katherine Houston, Linzy Macklin, Marguerite Robinett, S.C. Valley and Barbara Washington.

The mimeographed, hand-stapled Zionews was distributed every Sunday after church services.



The Health Ministry, originally called the Health Unit, and later the Health, Guidance and Wellness Ministry, was founded in 1976 by RN Gertrude Robinson Dawson. Mrs. Dawson, one of the founders of the Seattle Mary Mahoney Nurse, was the first African American nurse hired by Group Health in 1956. She recognized the need to provide medical assistance to members during worship services and church sponsored events.

WOMEN'S MINISTRY 82ND ANNIVERSARY


Dear Congregation:

Maybe you're the one always reaching for a sweater when others around you are roasting? There's no denying that people run at different temperatures. But if you find that you are constantly chilly, even in warmer environments, a medical condition may be to blame.

HERE ARE FOUR REASONS WHY YOU MIGHT BE ALWAYS COLD.

1. Anemia

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), almost 3 million people in the United States have anemia, a condition that occurs when you don't have enough healthy red blood cells to deliver oxygen to the body's tissues. As a result, it's common to feel cold (especially in the hands and feet), tired and weak. Other warning signs of anemia include shortness of breath, pale or yellowish skin, an irregular heartbeat and headaches.

2. Type 2 Diabetes

Diabetes, a chronic disease that affects how your body can turn food into energy, may cause you to feel cold, since it can affect blood flow and circulation. Diabetes can also lead to a condition known as peripheral neuropathy, which can cause a tingling feeling in your hands and feet.

3. Chronic Kidney Disease

Chronic kidney disease (CKD), which can be a complication of diabetes, occurs when the kidneys are damaged and cannot filter blood as well as they should. Feeling cold is an early sign of the condition, which affects some 37 million U.S. adults. The symptom is a result of your kidneys failing to produce a hormone called erythropoietin, which regulates the production of red blood cells, leading to anemia.

4. Hypothyroidism (underactive thyroid)

The main role of your thyroid — a small, butterfly-shaped gland at the base of your neck — is to control the speed of your metabolism, the process of how your body transforms the food you eat into energy your body needs to function.

Hypothyroidism occurs when your thyroid doesn't produce and release enough hormones, causing aspects of your metabolism to slow down.

NAAM is among the cultural organizations in the city of Seattle. It was established in 2008 and was previously known as Colman School.

Our Youth were provided with a guided and narrated tour led by Mr. Jason Turner, NAAM Education Coordinator, who provided them with a deep meaningful experience that was unforgettable. He also involved all of our youth by asking them questions to provide them with an interactive memorable and most importantly educational experience. All of the youth were very attentive and fully engaged during the entire 2-hour

tour. There was a large group of over 11 youth and 10 adults that included youth from Team Issachar, AB girls and other children in the community that are affiliated with Mount Zion Baptist Church.

The tour was rewarding and larger exploration on the question of how to make our public history institutions more accessible and racially equitable. Our students learned an important lesson on how museums especially African-American history museums do not appear magically, but are the product of years of struggle by public historians, activists, community members, elected officials, and scholars.

Our Youth had a great time. There was also a door and stained window that was removed from our very own Mount Zion Baptist Church on display from 1920 which shows the history of Mount Zion as well.

This was a very positive experience and allowed them to explore some exhibits in depth. What a rewarding experience for our youth!!




EASTER EGG HUNT

Firefighter Cardell is a fun guy. He has lived in Seattle his whole life. He went to Bailey Gatzert Elementary and Stevens Elementary a long time ago. When Firefighter Cardell went to elementary school, the Seattle Space Needle was brand new!

Firefighter Cardell likes to help out in his community. Sometimes he helps plan big events like walkathons and barbeques. Everyone in the neighborhood comes to the events that Firefighter Cardell plans. Firefighter Cardell is a Fire Inspector. Inspectors are special firefighters who make sure buildings follow important fire safety rules. Firefighter Cardell likes following rules. Firefighter Cardell says his favorite fire safety rule for kids is "always tell an adult if you find matches and lighters. Matches and lighters are tools for grownups."

Firefighter Cardell is a very hard worker. He inspects big buildings like hospitals and very tall buildings called high-rises. Firefighter Cardell has inspected lots of buildings. He has even been to the very top of the oldest high-rise in Seattle, The Smith Tower. Firefighter Cardell says "the best way to stay safe from fire is to stop a fire before it starts." By inspecting buildings, he prevents fires. He keeps people safe. He keeps other firefighters safe. Staying safe is very important to Firefighter Cardell. He practices fire safety at his house. He practices his fire drill and escape plan twice a year. He tests his smoke alarms once a month. He always keeps things that can burn away from heaters. Keeping his home safe from fire is important to Firefighter Cardell. You can also be a firefighter inspector in your home just like him!




