The Zionews Coordinating Committee was organized in 1956 by Deacon Tom Brown under the pastorate of Reverend Gil B. Lloyd.

Charter members included Edith Smith, Bessie Lyles, and Alva Smith. F. J. Johnson, Jr. was the editor of the first edition published in 1957.

That same year, the Committee expanded to include Yvonne Beatty, Zelda Brown, Clara Coleman, Nora Hatter, Helen Hornbuckle, Willie Horton, Katherine Houston, Linzy Macklin, Marguerite Robinett, S.C. Valley and Barbara Washington.

The mimeographed, hand-stapled Zionews was distributed every Sunday after church services.

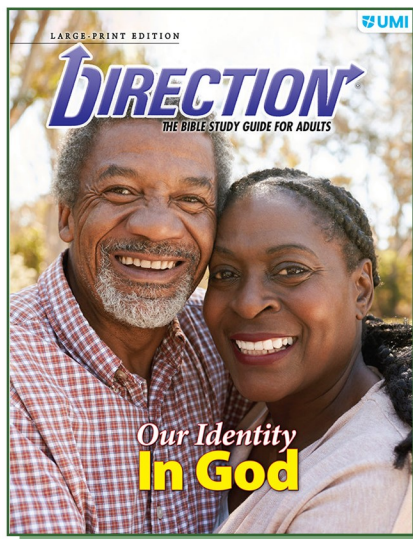

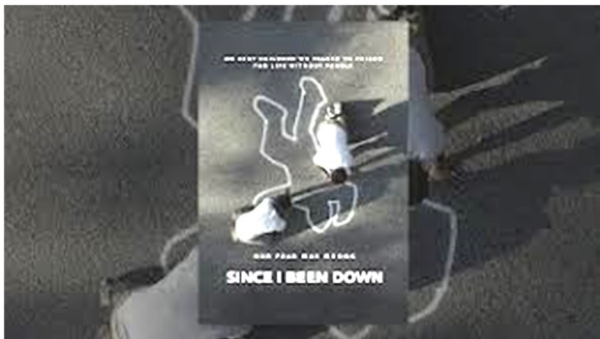

"Since I've Been Down takes us to Tacoma, Washington. Influenced by the national drug war frenzy and the fear-based culture of punishment in the 1980s-90s, Tacoma sacrificed its most-vulnerable children to a life behind bars. These children, who are now adults, cannot be silenced," says the synopsis. "As we hear them tell their stories, bravely, unapologetically, we realize: This is the story of 'Everytown USA'."

Kimonti Carter and a group of his peers maneuver through a non-negotiable pathway to joining gangs as early as 11-years-old. This is a community profoundly impacted by the city's disinvestment in housing, education, and employment as well as our policies in the 1990's

Kimonti Carter is the former president and current member of an over 40-year Washington State prisoner-initiated program, the Black Prisoners' Caucus. At 34, he founded TEACH (Taking Education and Creating History), a remarkably innovative prisoner education program. Learn more about Kimonti's journey and the experiences of others

GEORGE W. HICKMAN, JR., the late husband of Doris B. Hickman, was a pilot and charter member of the Sam Bruce Chapter.

THE TUSKEGEE AIRMEN were a group of African American military pilots and airmen who were trained to fly, maintain, and support combat aircraft in World War II. **Deacon Leslyn Jones-Petitt** is the daughter of **Tuskegee Airmen, William L. Booker** and her mother, **Dolores M. Booker** is one of 13 known surviving Tuskegee Airmen spouses.

Other surviving spouses and members of Mount Zion Baptist Church are Doris Hickman and Josephine Stokes.

All surviving spouses were invited to attend the 2024 Tuskegee Airmen, Inc. National Convention and Annual Business Meeting held August 15-18, 2024 at the Hyatt Regency Crystal City at Reagan National Airport in Virginia. The convention's theme was "Preserving Our History, Building Our Future". Deacon Petitt and Sis. Dolores Booker attended as guests of the convention to celebrate the achievements of the Tuskegee Airmen and honor the memory of William L. Booker. Today the Tuskegee Airmen organization is dedicated to preserving the legacy of the Tuskegee Airmen and inspiring future generations. They offer programs such as youth educational assistance and National Military Awards.



THE ARTS MINISTRY held a *'Fire Side Chat'* in the Parlor immediately after Worship Service on September 22. The purpose of this event was to have the Mount Zion Elders share some of their life stories and experiences with the membership. The first three Church Elders, the three oldest members of the church,



who were asked to participate in this event, were: *Mrs. Lou Annie Charles, Mrs. Josephine Stokes and Mr. Cecil Beatty.* Mrs. Stokes became ill the morning of the event and was unable to attend.

As members entered the Parlor, they were instructed to pick up a boxed lunch, water and find a comfortable seat. The lunches were sponsored by Mrs. Malver Haynes and catered by Kermit Sullivan of Sumerian Catering Services.

The format was very casual with these individuals answering five to six questions posed to them by Mrs. Debra Harris-Branham and Mrs. Pat Bruce-Sullivan.

Program participants were given these questions prior to the event. The questioning started with asking them "What brought YOU to Seattle" and concluded with them sharing additional information that they would like with the group. The audience sat glued to their seats in 'a-h-h-h' of these individuals and the experiences they shared and sometimes giving a roaring laugh to what was said.

We see these individuals at church on Sundays, but have no idea... (1) that they joined Mt. Zion in 1942 and 1943. (2) that Mrs. Charles' only job was with the Boeing Company. She joined when she was very young and eventually retired from Boeing and is called a 'Rosie the Riveter'. (3). that Mr. Beatty was in the military when First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt visited the Base where he was stationed, flew with one of his fellow black airmen and Declared them Fit to Fly--thus bringing about the Tuskegee Airmen. The afternoon went on and on with Historical Information for those present.



Mr. Beatty opened the event by serenading us on his Ukulele. The event closed with him singing one of his favorite songs while playing the Ukulele. He also plays the Harmonica.

What a rich history we have here at Mount Zion within our membership.

With the success of this event, the ARTS Ministry will be continuing its 'Fire Side Chats' the first of next year. The next oldest members of the church will be the featured presenters.
