TRANSFIGURATION SUNDAY

TRANSFIGURATION SUNDAY ~ MARCH 2nd

The final Sunday following Epiphany, and before Lent, is Transfiguration Sunday. All three of the synoptic gospels tell a story of Peter, James, and John accompanying Jesus to the top of a holy mountain. There, before their eyes, Jesus is transfigured or transformed into a dazzling brightness.

The transfiguration is recorded in each of the Synoptic Gospels (Matthew 17:1-9; Mark 9:2-10; Luke 9:28-36) and in 2 Peter 1:16-21. The place of this event is "a high mountain" (Matthew 17:1; Mark 9:2).



About a week after Jesus plainly told His disciples that He would suffer, be killed, and be raised to life (Luke 9:22), He took Peter, James, and John up a mountain to pray. While praying, His personal appearance was changed into a glorified form, and His clothing became dazzling white. Moses and Elijah appeared and talked with Jesus about His death that would soon take place. Peter, not knowing what he was saying and being very fearful, offered to put up three shelters for them. This is undoubtedly a reference to the booths that were used to celebrate the Feast of Tabernacles, when the Israelites dwelt in booths for 7 days (Lev. 23:34–42). Peter was expressing a wish to stay in that place. When a cloud enveloped them, a voice said, "This is My Son, whom I have chosen, whom I love; listen to Him!" The cloud lifted, Moses and Elijah had disappeared, and Jesus was alone with His disciples who were still very much afraid. Jesus warned them not to tell anyone what they had seen until after His resurrection. The three accounts of this event are found in Matthew 17:1-8, Mark 9:2-8, and Luke 9:28-36.

The purpose of the transfiguration of Christ into at least a part of His heavenly glory was so that the "inner circle" of His disciples could gain a greater understanding of who Jesus was. Christ underwent a dramatic change in appearance in order that the disciples could behold Him in His glory. The disciples, who had only known Him in His human body, now had a greater realization of the deity of Christ, though they could not fully comprehend it. That gave them the reassurance they needed after hearing the shocking news of His coming death.

Symbolically, the appearance of Moses and Elijah represented the Law and the Prophets. But God's voice from heaven – "Listen to Him!" - clearly showed that the Law and the Prophets must give way to Jesus. The One who is the new and living way is replacing the old – He is the fulfillment of the Law and the countless prophecies in the Old Testament. Also, in His glorified form they saw a preview of His coming glorification and enthronement as King of kings and Lord of lords.

The disciples never forgot what happened that day on the mountain and no doubt this was intended. John wrote in his gospel, "We have seen His glory, the glory of the one and only" (John 1:14). Peter also wrote of it, "We did not follow cleverly invented stories when we told you about the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we were eyewitnesses of His majesty. For He received honor and glory from God the Father when the voice came to Him from the Majestic Glory, saying, 'This is my Son, whom I love; with Him I am well pleased.' We ourselves heard this voice that came from heaven when we were with Him on the sacred mountain" (2 Peter 1:16-18). Those who witnessed the transfiguration bore witness to it to the other disciples and to countless millions down through the centuries.

The Transfiguration story helps to prepare us to enter Lent.

SEASON OF LENT



Lent (Latin: *Quadragesima*, 'Fortieth'- March 5, 2025) is a religious observance in the Christian liturgical calendar commemorating the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the desert, according to the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, before beginning his public ministry, during which he endured temptation by Satan.

This season is observed in the Anglican, Eastern Orthodox, Lutheran, Methodist, Moravian, Oriental Orthodox, Reformed (including Presbyteri-

an and Congregationalist), United Protestant and Roman Catholic Churches. Some Baptist and nondenominational Christian churches also observe Lent.

Which days are enumerated as being part of Lent differs between denominations, although in all of them Lent is described as lasting for a total duration of 40 days. In Western Churches, Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends approximately six weeks later; depending on the Christian denomination and local custom, Lent concludes either on the evening of Maundy Thursday, or at sundown on Holy Saturday, when the Easter Vigil is celebrated. Sundays may or may not be excluded, depending on the denomination. In Eastern Churches (whether Eastern Orthodox, Eastern Lutheran, or Eastern Catholic), Lent is observed continuously without interruption for 40 days starting on Clean Monday and ending on Lazarus Saturday before Holy Week.

Lent is often viewed as a season of grief that necessarily ends with a great celebration of Easter. Thus, it is known in Eastern Orthodox circles as the season of "bright sadness" ne (Greek: $\chi \alpha \rho \mu o \lambda \dot{u} \pi \eta$, Romanized: *charmolypê*).

The purpose of Lent is the preparation of the believer for Easter through prayer, mortifying the flesh, repentance of sins, almsgiving, simple living, and self-denial. In Lent, many Christians commit to fasting, as well as giving up certain luxuries in imitation of Jesus Christ's sacrifice during his journey into the desert for 40 days; this is known as one's Lenten sacrifice.

Many Christians also add a Lenten spiritual discipline, such as reading a daily devotional or praying through a Lenten calendar, to draw themselves near to God. Sometimes observed are the Stations of the Cross, a devotional commemoration of Christ's carrying the Cross and crucifixion. Some churches also remove flowers from their altars and veil crucifixes, religious statues that show the triumphant Christ, and other elaborate religious symbols in violet fabrics in solemn observance of the event.

In most denominations, the last week of Lent coincides with Holy Week, starting with Palm Sunday. Following the New Testament, Jesus' crucifixion is commemorated on Good Friday, and at the beginning of the next week the joyful celebration of Easter Sunday, the start of the Easter season, which recalls the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. In many of the Christian denominations, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday form the Easter Triduum.

Lent is the Christian season of spiritual preparation before Easter. In Western churches, it begins on Ash Wednesday (March 5, 2025). During Lent, many Christians observe a period of fasting, self-denial, repentance, moderation, and spiritual discipline. The purpose of the Lenten season is to set aside time for reflection on Jesus Christ—to consider His suffering and His sacrifice, His life, death, burial ... and triumphant resurrection.



ASH WEDNESDAY (MARCH 5, 2025) is a Christian holy day of prayer and fasting. It is preceded by Shrove Tuesday and falls on the first day of Lent (the six weeks of penitence before Easter). Ash Wednesday is traditionally observed by Western Christians. It is observed by Catholics in the Roman Rite, Anglicans, Lutherans, Methodists, Nazarenes, Moravians, as well as by many from the Reformed tradition.

In esday As it is the first day of Lent, many Christians begin Ash Wednesday by marking service a Lenten calendar, praying a Lenten daily devotional, and making a Lenten sacrifice that they will not partake of until the arrival of Eastertide.

Many Christians attend special church services. Ash Wednesday derives its name from the placing of repentance ashes on the foreheads of participants to either the words "Repent, and believe in the Gospel" or the dictum "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." The ashes are often prepared by burning palm leaves from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebrations.

Each year, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent and is 46 days before Easter Sunday. Lent is a 40-day season (not counting Sundays) marked by repentance, fasting, reflection, and ultimately celebration. The 40-day period represents Christ's time of temptation in the wilderness, where He fasted and where Satan tempted Him. Lent asks believers to set aside a time each year for similar fasting, marking an intentional season of focus on Christ's life, ministry, sacrifice, and resurrection. The ashes of this holiday symbolize two main things: death and repentance. Ashes are equivalent to dust, and human flesh is composed of dust or clay (Genesis 2:7), and when a human corpse decomposes, it returns to dust or ash.

Often called the Day of Ashes, Ash Wednesday starts Lent by focusing the Christian's heart on repentance and prayer, usually through personal and communal confession. This happens during a special Ash Wednesday service.

"When we come forward to receive ashes on Ash Wednesday, we are saying that we are sorry for our sins, and that we want to use the season of Lent to correct our faults, purify our hearts, control our desires and grow in holiness so we will be prepared to celebrate Easter with great joy."

With this focus on our own mortality and sinfulness, Christians can enter into the Lent season solemnly, while also looking forward in greater anticipation and joy of the message of Easter and Christ's ultimate victory over sin and death.

In many congregations, the ashes are prepared by burning palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday. On Palm Sunday, churches bless and hand out palm branches to attendees, a reference to the Gospels' account of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, when onlookers lay palm branches on his path.

Prayer for Lent:

O Lord, Most Holy One, have mercy on us. We confess our sins to you. We have fallen short of your glory and without your mercy and grace, we would be dust. We repent now. Lord, as we enter into this Lenten season. Be near to us. Help us, by your Holy Spirit, to feel the right conviction and repentance for our sin. Help us to have the strength to overcome the enemy and draw closer to you. Amen

OUR FOREMOTHERS: WOMEN OF WISDOM

Since the founding of Mount Zion Baptist Church in 1890, our foremothers have been faithful servants of the Lord and an integral part of this Church. They were prayer warriors, members of the predominantly white congregation at First Baptist Church, who wanted a church for their own community. Many of their names are lost to us; however, some records have listed the following women as founding members of Mount Zion: *Mrs. Birdett, Mrs. Braxton, Mrs. E. W. Butler, Mrs. Robert A. Clark, Mrs. Edmunds, Mrs. Eliza Washington, Mrs. Sheppard and Miss Sallie Freeman*. They were the foundation for our current Women's Ministry.

Mrs. Martha Payne, who initiated negotiations in 1904 for the purchase of the property on which Mount Zion's first building was erected, served as the President of the Women's Missionary Society in the early 1900's; Former First Lady Corine Carter also held this position in the 1910's; Mrs. Annie Coleman (1920's) and Mrs. Ora Bell Jackson (1930's)



Deaconess Clara J. Bonner served three terms as President of the Women's Baptist Missionary Society, 1920's – 1930's.

She served eight consecutive terms as President of the Women's Convention of the General Baptist Association of Washington and was our representative for the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc. She chaired the Deaconess Board from 1942 to 1945, and was awarded **Life-Time Deaconess** status in 1947.



served as President from 1938 to 1941.

She was the President of the \Women's Department of the North Pacific Baptist Convention in 1948 and from 1950 to 1953.





Former First Lady Vivienne Penick was President of the Women's Missionary Society,1941 - 1942. She holds the title of President Emeritus for the Women's Department of the North Pacific Baptist Convention where she was President from 1948 to 1950. She was also the Recording Secretary for the Women's Department of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc. from 1948 to 1950.



Deaconess Allen Mae Douglas was elected to serve as the first President of the re-organized Women's Society in January of 1943. (1942 - 1944). She also served as Chair of the Deaconess Board in 1954.



Documents on which we base our 81st Anniversary recorded *Former First Lady Doris Watts Lloyd* as the speaker for the first Women's Day Program that was held on May 13, 1956, at 3:00 p.m.

She was president of the NPBC Women's Department from 1966 to 1969.
